



## VENDOR GUIDELINES 2018

1. Only the following Massachusetts grown or produced items that meet all applicable federal, state and local regulations may be offered for sale at the Church Green Farmers Market: vegetables, fruits, herbs, plants, cut flowers, unprocessed honey, maple syrup, cider, dairy products, poultry, meat, and seafood. Additionally, locally produced specialty foods and baked goods.
2. All Farmers must agree to allow the CGFM team to visit their farms to learn how to better market you.
3. Vendors of non-food items will be approved on an individual basis.
4. Farmers may sell only produce they have grown themselves, or have on consignment from another local farmer.
5. Farmers and all other vendors will post prices for all items in a conspicuous manner.
6. Farmers accepting MDAR coupons will post a sign saying so.
7. All items for sale at the CGFM must be first quality, unless expressly labeled "seconds".
8. All processed foods must comply with federal, state, and local laws and regulations.
9. Each farm or vendor must post a sign identifying their business and its location.
10. If a vendor cannot attend the market, CGFM must be informed at least 24 hours prior to the market day (call 508.822.2107 or email [office@firstparishtaunton.org](mailto:office@firstparishtaunton.org)).
11. Selling will begin at 9:00 am, and no selling may take place before this time.
12. Vendors will arrive no later than 8:30 am, and be completely set up by 9:00 am.
13. Vendors must agree to sell for the entire market day.
14. No vendor shall smoke tobacco, drink alcohol, or use any controlled substance while on the property of First Parish Church.
15. In the event of a dispute regarding any aspect of the CGFM, the market supervisor (as designated by First Parish Church) shall resolve the issue and her/his decision is final. Any failure to abide by the market supervisor's decision may be sufficient grounds for excluding a vendor from the market. A decision may be appealed to the Board of First Parish Church.
16. Vendors are urged to carry insurance to cover the extent of their operations.
